## YOUTH FIELD TRIP FLORENCE, AL

DON BLALOCK--MAGS Youth, mark your calendar for Saturday, March 9, 2002. We will be traveling to Florence, Alabama to collect fossils, including blastoids and archimedes. Blastoids are small well-defined echinoderms (a group of invertibrates) which in life were attached to the sea bed by a thin stem. The compact theca is shaped like a rosebud. The rose bud part is what you will be collecting. The archimedes is a bryozoa which has a distinctive corkscrew appearance. Blastoids and archimedes were both alive in the Florence area 330 million years ago, during the Carboniferous (Mississippian) period of the Paleozoic era. ## **DMC FIELD TRIP** ALABAMA GARNETS

AN OFFICIAL FIELD TRIP OF THE MONTGOMERY GEM AND MINERAL SOCIETY (HOST) ASHLAND, ALABAMA -- 9:00am, Saturday, February 16, 2002

CHILDREN: All ages are always encouraged to attend.

**PETS:** Only if kept under control.

**TRIP:** to Erin Road, Clay County to collect garnet crystals. There are no trip fees associated with this trip!

**COLLECTING:** Massive almandine garnet crystals; samples will be displayed before trip.

**COLLECTING AREA:** This area is in the Talladega National Forest. Our collecting will be along a dirt road that runs through privately managed forest land. We will be collecting on the road surface, the banks, and the area near the road. There are other materials that can be collected in this same area. No large holes are allowed, however there are plenty of easily collected garnets. Although the material is "poor" quality, it can be cabbed or used for spheres and eggs. The garnets have an interesting red/orange appearance with healed fractures and inclusions.

**BRING:** something to collect in, simple digging tools, lunch and something warm to drink.

**DIRECTIONS AND WHERE TO MEET:** We will meet in the Winn Dixie Parking lot in Wetumpka, AL at 9:00am Central. Follow Highway 231 north from Montgomery into Wetumpka. Turn right into the Winn Dixie parking lot. We will be staging from there to go north to Ashland on Hwy 9.

If you wish to meet us in Ashland, you will pass 2 gas station/ convenience stores as you go west out of Ashland on SR 77. We will meet at this last convenience store/gas station which is located about 1 1/2 mile from the town square on the south side of SR 77. The Wetumpka group is expected to arrive at the Ashland meeting location about 10:00 CT (+/- 20 minutes).

Drive Time: Approximately 4 hours from Memphis.

### MID-SOUTH ARCHAEOLOGY CHUCALISSA ABANDONED HOUSE

#### **CHUCALISSA**

(Choctaw word meaning "Abandoned House")

The ruins of this native American town sit on the Mississippi bluff five miles south of downtown Memphis. At one time the population of Chucalissa could have been a thousand to fifteen hundred.

The town existed into the seventeenth century, when its townspeople left and never returned. Hence the name

Chucalissa. Since most native Americans north of the Rio Grande never developed a written language, we can never know the town's real name.



## MAGS INVOLVEMENT IN THE DEVELOPMENT OF CHUCALISSA


"In December, 1951, the Memphis Archaeological and Geological Society received the formal invitation from Mr. L.G. McLean, State Naturalist, to initiate and take charge of the excavations at the T.O. Fuller State Park site preliminary to its establishment as a State Archaeological Park." "These mounds were first called to the attention of the University of Tennessee in 1940 when the CCC project began clearing this area. During the summer of that year extensive testing operations were carried out to determine the nature of the site and its suitability for development into an exhibit. At this time, the national Park Service came into the picture, and plans were completed for a Natural Museum. All these plans and efforts were cancelled by World War II." "After the war years, the Memphis Archaeological and Geological Society made repeated efforts to reactivate the program but with only moderate success until 1955, when Governor Clement granted a small appropriation which enabled the entire project to be resumed on a small scale." Actual work began in 1955 "The first actual archaeological work was started in July 1955. This work exposed the method by which this area was originally built up and gave a hint to the earlier period of occupancy of this site." Later visitors to the site could tell from this first excavation that there had been intense activity here by

the Middle Mississippian Indians over a long period of time. "Pottery seriation at this site revealed that this site was occupied from the earliest Mississippian period until the final disappearance of the Mississippian culture on the Mississippi River." By November 1955, a substantial amount of material had been removed from the site and the "lab" work of treating and cleaning specimens and skeletal remains had begun. At this point findings included ten pottery vessels and the burial remains of six individuals (two adults, one juvenile about twelve years old, and three infants). The early years were a huge success! On November 26, 1955 several members of the society began work on one of the Indian houses. An area fifteen feet square was leveled for the structure. The next step was to cut and set the wall poles, then bend them inward to form the roof. After three more sessions in December, 1955 and early 1956, society members had completed work on the house by weaving cane mats for the walls and plastering them with clay. Work on the earthlodge exhibit area and the pyramidal mound continued through 1956. Among the artifacts found in the burial sites were a toy effigy pot found in the infant graves, and the skeleton of a coon, with the arrow still in him, lying in a red and white bowl. Visitor attendance at the "far-from complete" Chucalissa Archaeological Museum during July and August of 1956 was in excess of 15,000. It was a huge success!

### **DINOSAUR FACTS** ABRICTOSAURUS

Pronounced: ah - Brick - toe -Saw-rus
Diet: Herbivore (plant eater)
Name Means: "Wide Awake Lizard"
Length: 4 feet (1.3 m)
Height: 1.3 feet (35 cm)
Weight: unknown
Time: Early Jurassic 200 mya

Abrictosaurus provides more evidence that dinosaurs originated in or near what is now South America. This little plant-eating dinosaur lived at the very beginning of the Jurassic Period and looked like many of the early dinosaurs. It would have walked on its hind legs and been a swift runner. Although the fossils were discovered in South Africa, scientists know that this region was once attached to South America during the Jurassic Period. Paleontologists think that the dinosaurs spread out all over the region by migration, a type of travel that spreads animals to different parts of the world. So far, the earliest dinosaur fossils have been discovered in South America and the surrounding lands that were connected to it during the Early Mesozoic.

What scientists know of Abrictosaurus comes mostly from the skull fragments of a single specimen. This specimen is believed to be a female of the genus Heterodontosaurus. It is believed to be of this genus because it possesses similar dentition, although it lacks large canines.

### SPECIMEN OF THE MONTH PYRITE FeS2

Pyrite is a metallic mineral composed of iron and sulfur. It forms in a wide range of environments including hydrothermal veins and igneous rocks, in slates, and in shales. The crystals appear in a variety of forms: striated cubes, pyritohedral crystals, radiated disk forms, and pyritized fossils. known as "Fool's Gold", it is the most common sulfide mineral and occurs worldwide. Pyrite was used by ancient Greeks and Romans for mirrors and jewelry. Sources include the United States, Spain, and Italy. MAGS members enjoy collecting pyrite from Magnet Cove, Arkansas and Starkville, Mississippi.
