## Collecting at Ron Coleman Crystal Mine

**DAVID DAY**: It would be hard to imagine November 2007's field trip to the Ron Coleman Crystal Mine in Jessieville, AR possibly having more perfect conditions than we were lucky enough to enjoy. Rain had recently washed everything and the chilly morning quickly gave way to *just-cool-enough* which made it easy to collect crystals that, in some cases being freshly washed, sat openly catching the morning light and just waiting to be picked up, or if you preferred, to seriously get down and dig into the loose and not too wet mounds. If you were an early bird, there were no footprints or freshly turned dirt ahead of you. However, deer season (so we heard from rumor and the frequent but distant bangs) had called the dozer man away, so there were no fresh deposits dumped while we collected, although we were really busy enough without them. About twenty people signed my record book, checked in at the gift shop around 8:00 a.m. and then headed into the collecting area. I had the good fortune to

Garnet: The garnet at its best is a deep, rich red or purple-red although they come in practically every color except blue. Early scientists named the stone from the Latin granatus, which means "seed like," because garnet crystals in a rock reminded them of the shape and color of pomegranate seeds. It was believed also to possess many curative powers. Asians used garnets as bullets in the belief that their strong red color would inflict a deadly wound. The most expensive garnet is the brilliant green variety called demantoid (diamond like), which approaches emerald shade and exceeds the diamond in fire or dispersion. The finest of these garnets, which are quite rare, are found in the Ural Mountains.

#### Date/Time: Saturday, February 24, 2007 10am-4pm EST Location: The Famous Hogg Mine, Troup County, GA

**COLLECTING:** Rose quartz, tourmaline, beryl, mica books and quartz crystal. The Rose Quartz will star if cut correctly and some of the beryl can be gemmy Aquamarine.

**DIRECTIONS:** From Atlanta, take I-85 south to LaGrange. Exit onto Hwy 219 also Whitesville Rd (exit 13) and go south (left) about 2.2 miles from I-85. We will be meeting at Smith's Corner Store (the Citgo on the left) at the intersection at Whitesville Rd. and Bartley Rd. From Carrollton, take Hwy 2 South past Wal-Mart. Go through Franklin and LaGrange. Just stay straight and Hwy 27 dumps into Hwy 219. Take Hwy 219 south and cross I-85. Allow 1 hour and 15 minutes from Atlanta at I285 and I-85 connection on the south side.

**FEE:** Adults \$15 and children under 17 are free. Upon arrival you will be required to sign a waiver of liability.

WHAT TO BRING: Pick, shovel, rock hammer, chisels, scratching tools, screen, buckets and, of course, plenty of water. Big'Un's Barbecue will smoke a pig on-site and barbecue plates and drinks will be available for a nominal charge. There is a port-o-john on site. JXR T-shirts, field trip guide books and specimens will also be available for sale. We have been lucky and had beautiful clear and even warm weather in February but extra clothes/boots might be useful if it's muddy or the weather turns cold.

## **HELP PRESERVE ACCESS TO OUR COLLECTING SITES!**

#### A message forwarded by **THE SOUTHEAST FEDERATION OF MINERALOGICAL SOCIETIES, INC.** The Friendly Federation – Founded in 1976 to serve.

Hi All!

As most of you know, BLM and the Forest Service have been closing roads all over the place and we are losing collecting areas. There are two efforts ongoing that are vital to our future collecting. First, most of the environmental groups wish to close roads and trails in the public lands so they can be made into wilderness areas. That means NO VEHICLES. Thus, closing of roads are a favorite target to start the process.

However, some of those roads are used by county governments and others for a number of uses. So there has been a full scale effort to assert the claims of existing roads and trails from closing. A number of law suits have been started and pressure has been applied to Congress to correct the situation.

Representative Steve Pearce of New Mexico has introduced a bill (HR6298) to protect the public rights of access granted by Congress under the old law R.S. 2477 and further protected by the new law, The Federal Land Management and Policy Act.

I request that everyone send Representative Pearce a BIG THANK YOU note for his effort. We are quick to ask for assistance but often fail to say thank you when our representatives respond. In this case, this bill will be reintroduced into the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress and we will need the help of a number of representatives and senators to get it passed. By sending a thank you note to Representative Pearce, we give him the means to ask other members to support this bill. PLEASE send a message. His address is:

Second, there is an ongoing survey by the Forest Service to identify which roads will remain open and which will be closed. This survey is called the Travel Management Planning Process. The Forest Service is asking those that use the forest roads to identify those roads and trails that we use so they can study which should remain open. All others will be closed to vehicle traffic. To my knowledge the process is ongoing in New Mexico, Arizona and, of all places, Connecticut. I suggest you check out the Forest Service in your area and make sure the roads to our collecting sites are covered.
