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CHARLES MCPHERSON A TRIBUTE BY GEORGE LOUD

On Wednesday, January 21st, we lost our good friend and lifetime MAGS member, Charles McPherson. Charlie would have been 95 on April 7th. As his minister said at Charlie's funeral service, "Big Rock" Charlie the rock collector, was himself collected by his Lord and creator. His niece Luci Wallace said that as recently as several weeks earlier Charlie had been hauling rocks around in his garden. Charlie led a wonderful, interesting, and active life almost to the very end.

Most MAGS members probably knew Charlie as the host of numerous club picnics at his home in Brighton TN and as the artist who conceived "Rocky" the rockhound and all those wonderful cartoons that for so long appeared in the club newsletter. I have known Charlie since I was 14 years old, about 48 years. Perhaps I can share a few stories you may not have heard before.

When I first met Charlie he was an "old" bachelor who lived with a bachelor brother and his dad (died at age 99) in an old farmhouse in Germantown, now very valuable real estate. On one visit to Germantown I noted magazines stacked floor to ceiling on the porch and inquired about them. "Oh, those belong to Daddy. He intends to read them when he finds time." Given the fact that Charlie's dad was 98 or 99 at the time, I considered the plan to be optimism to the extreme. Neither Charlie nor his brother knew how to cook and depended on their aged, widower father to do the cooking and otherwise take care of them. Charlie never did learn how to cook. He had mineral specimens in his bedroom and to retrieve them for show he would crack the door ever so slightly, slip in, and reverse the process coming back out. Charlie freely admitted his room



SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 2004 • 8:30am RAZOR ROCK MATERIALS COMPANY HOSTED BY THE CENTRAL ARKANSAS GEM, MINERAL AND GEOLOGY SOCIETY

COLLECTING SITE: The Razor Rock Materials Company, located in Poinsett County near Harrisburg, Arkansas. This trip is open to all MAGS members and collecting is free at these sites.

SPECIMENS: Marine invertebrate fossils, agates, jasper (great for tumbler stock) petrified wood and maybe a few geodes. These specimens may be found in the limestone rock matrix.

MEETING TIME/PLACE: 8:30 am, McDonald's Restaurant, located on AR-1 just south of Exit 241A of I-40. Come earlier if you plan to eat breakfast. We will convoy to the Razor Rock Materials facility promptly at 9:00 am. We will travel north on AR-1 towards Harrisburg (It's almost 1/2 hour driving time). Follow AFMS Field Trip Convoy Guidelines.

DRIVING DIRECTIONS: From Memphis take I-40 West towards Little Rock, then AR-1 South exit number 241A, towards Forrest City. Allow approximately 1-1/2 to 2 hours driving time.

TOOLS: Bring rock pick, hammer, chisel, pry bar, screwdriver, leather gloves, safety glasses, etc. Newspapers for wrapping specimens and collecting containers such as bucket or clothe bags. **SAFETY NOTES:** While at these sites, all safety rules must be followed. All children and junior members must be supervised by an adult member at all times. Please be advised that there is always a possibility for injury. Sorry, no pets please. Follow AFMS safety rules, code of ethics and collect courtesy code.

DIFFICULTY LEVEL: 5-7 on a scale of 1 (easy) to 10 (hard).

- **9:00am** Travel to the Razor Rock Materials facility.
- 12:00 noon We'll break for lunch. Please bring a sack or picnic lunch, that way we will be able to stay at the quarry and collect longer. Also, bring plenty of cold soft drinks and/or hot coffee or chocolate.

was a mess and that he was ashamed of it. He never learned how to keep house either. Several years ago when myself and Dr. Jim Cole visited him, Jim asked if he ever watched his TV. Charlie volunteered that he had watched a football game that very afternoon, whereupon Jim took a nearby brush and proceeded to brush about a 1/8 inch layer of dust off of the screen, creating a cloud that drove me from the room.

Charlie was an extremely talented individual. Aside from a WWII stint in the army air force, the only job he knew as an adult was that as a machinist, working for International Harvester in Memphis. A master machinist he was, as evidenced by the 30+ inch diamond saw he built himself. He built his home in Brighton, including a massive stone (specimen - petrified wood, etc.) largely by himself with the help of a few subcontractors. His ability as an artist/cartoonist has already been noted but was perhaps surpassed by his carving ability. I hope that his moonshiner's cabin (made of petrified wood) and carved figurines that went with it, which Charlie carved, end up with someone who will appreciate them. He was also very strong as a younger man. If my brother or I found a large petrified log in one of our countless outings in Crow Creek, Charlie would throw it in his duffle bag, throw the bag over his shoulder and walk the creek bed carrying that bag.

Charlie was an environmentalist before environmentalism became trendy. In addition to his membership in MAGS, he was a member of a bird watchers club and a member of a wildflower society. He always cautioned us not to litter. Charlie keenly appreciated the beauty of all of God's creation.

Charlie loved children and kept photos of the young ones, including that of my daughter Kelly, on his refrigerator. I recall a visit to his home by a lady and her daughter, both MAGS members at the time. Charlie had just finished making and polishing a hardwood display cabinet in which he intended to house some of his mineral specimens. When the little girl admired it he gave it away on the spot. Charlie's charity and kindness were shown many times and in a variety of ways. Indeed he took into his home an entire family of five who had been down on their luck. Women were another matter. We would tease Charlie, saying that he appeared to be sweet on so-andso, which Charlie would vehemently deny and become somewhat agitated. Therefore, it came as something of a shock when I learned that Charlie had married Emily, a fellow MAGS member. Charlie was a

... **tumbling tip**. Need proof that it is a good idea to use separate barrels for your rough and polishing stages? Try this! After completing your rough grit stage(s) thoroughly wash your rocks and grit barrel. Return the rocks to that same barrel, fill with clean water and tumble for about 10-15 minutes. Open your barrel and check out the water. It most likely will be a dirty gray. Dirty gray is not a polishing medium. So buy that second barrel.

... calcite and limelight. The phrase "in the limelight" was coined to refer to actors performing on the stage prior to electricity and the lighting was generated by the heating of calcite, which, when heated turns to lime and calcium oxide and produces a bright glow.

... fossil news. German scientists have discovered a batch of petrified nuts in lignite coal, estimated to be about 17 million years old.

people person and I suspect that his happiest years were those he spent with Emily who shared his interests in rocks and gardens.

At about the age of 14 myself and my brother Jim (4 years younger) started to go on field trips with Charlie. In addition to the aforementioned trips to Crow Creek, we went on numerous trips with Charlie to Hot Springs, Mt. Ida and Magnet Cove, Arkansas. Charlie was on a first name basis with Ocus Stanley Senior, Lawton Kimzey and Joe Kimzey, after whom the mineral Kimzeyite was named. Another frequent destination was Marion, Kentucky and the Illinois fluorite district, where it seemed that every porch and half the yards for miles were covered thick with specimens. The first stop in the fluorite area was always Ben Clements' place. Ben was always very pleased to see Charlie, perhaps because Charlie always spent a lot of money. If ever in the area of Marion, Kentucky be sure to visit the Ben Clements' Museum. Unfortunately, most of the labelling in the Clements Museum is deficient because of lack of mine attribution. Another favorite stop was the home of Mr. Goolsby in Rosiclare, Illinois.

When I was 16 Charlie took Jim and myself on an extended collecting trip through the tri-state area, Oklahoma and Colorado. We collected selenite in Oklahoma and Almandine garnets at the old Salida copper mine and visited the Royal Gorge, Rocky Mountain National Park, and Cripple Creek. Prior to leaving on this extended trip my parents had Charlie over to dinner, I think for the purpose of checking him out. We loaded Charlie's old Buick with canned food I was supposed to cook at campsites in Colorado. As it turned out I only cooked when Charlie wanted to get rid of those cans to make room for more rocks. Upon pulling out of my parents drive, bound for Colorado, the tailpipe and muffler fell off Charlie's old Buick, which event was less than reassuring to my parents. We wired the assembly back up and were on our way. Returning home through the tri-state area, we made a second stop at Boodle Lane's place near Joplin, Missouri, where Charlie purchased a 2 foot long cluster of beautiful, huge yellow Calcite scalenohedral xls. Somewhere in Arkansas Charlie stopped roadside to get a cold drink from the ice chest in the trunk and some twenty minutes later down the road Charlie remembered he had taken out the Calcite specimen to get to the ice chest. We quickly turned around but the specimen was gone and Charlie never did recover it. If only I had the foresight to be photographed with Ben Clements, Goolsby, Ocus Stanley, and the Kimzeys, all now legends in the hobby. Sad to say, in this day and age, parents would be unlikely to trust someone like Charlie, largely a stranger to them, to take their children on such an adventure.

As an adult I made several collecting trips with Charlie after Emily had passed away. The most recent was about five years ago as guests of Dr. Jim Cole at his cabin outside of Crystal Springs (near Mt. Ida). Charlie greatly admired Dr. Cole and thoroughly enjoyed the trip, even though the sad condition of his feet limited his collecting ability–he could only wear moccasins with strategically cut holes.

Charlie, there will never be another exactly like you and we miss you greatly. Please put in a good word for us.

MY BIRTHSTONE IS PEARL . . . AND MOONSTONE . . . AND ALEXANDRITE AN INTERVIEW WITH JENNIFER BALDWIN

My birthstone is pearl . . . and moonstone . . . and alexandrite and I heard recently that the color for my month is silver. I really like alexandrite because of the way it changes colors in light. My high school ring is alexandrite. Right now it is a very pretty green, but in a different light it will be blue or pinkish. I like minerals that change color or show signs of fire, like fire opal and fire agate. Even labradorite shows streaks of golden fire. Of course I like labradorite because of its name too. My family had a sweet black labrador retriever for many years. Every time I see labradorite, I think of our dog, Sadé [Shar'day].

One of my favorite minerals is fire opal. I think it is so cool the way the different colors just shimmer through the rock. I have a few pieces of fire opal; some from Spencer Mine and one opal from Louisiana that I got last year at the rock show. Another one of my favorite rocks is grape agate. It's bubbly and purple! In April, MAGS and my Venture Crew are going to Crater of Diamond State Park in Arkansas, and I'm not leaving until I find a huge diamond! I may be there a really long time, but I'm staying!
