Roadcut

WC McDANIEL, MAGS PRESIDENT: MAGS Roadcut brings you little tidbits and useful information each month. The MAGS Fossil Section Group will start in February, so the next few Roadcuts will focus on fossils:

- The word "fossil" is derived from the Latin word "fossilis" which means 'to be dug up."
- Originally fossils referred to any item dug up: fossils, rocks, minerals or man-made artfacts. Later it was revised to refer to naturally buried and preserved remains of organisms that lived on a earth long time ago.
- Many believe the origins of fossils either was from the great biblical flood or grew inside rocks. Greek philosophers believed fossils formed similar to crystals or stalagtites. Leonard De Vinci believed fossils were the petrified remains of onceliving organisms. However, due the heretical beliefs of that time his writings were not published until the 19th century.
- The discovery and study of fossils contributed greatly to the production of the first geological maps as it was observed that different types of rocks contained different kinds of fossils.

Contact information: Jay Batcha: 478-784-1965 • Cell [day of dig only] 478-319-2859 • rocky1s@cox.net **Trip:** The new Wilkes Co. pay-to-dig amethyst site is located in Northwest Wilkes County, Georgia, between the communities of Rayle and Tignall in an area known as Jackson's Crossroads (abbreviated JXR). Boulders at this site contain vugs that are drusy lined and some have deep purple amethyst. The quality of these are sometimes of incredible water clear clarity and have a deep purple color that is quite unique. Bring tools to dig they crystals out, but there are also plenty of free crystals in the soil. Visit www.dixieeuhedrals.net for information about this site.

Collecting: Amethyst crystals, facet grade amethyst, and clear quartz crystals. You will find some of the finest amethyst in Georgia and the southeast.

Bring: Sledgehammer, safety glasses, rock hammers, chisels, shovel, pick, scratching tools, and bucket with something to protect your finds such as newspaper, bubble wrap, or, etc. There will be food and drinks to buy. Dress for the weather. It can be cold this time of year. If you would like to bring stuff to trade, that would be great addition to this field trip.

Where we will meet: Dollar General Store in Tignall, GA [between Washington and Elberton on Hwy 17]. Coming from the South on I-20 take exit 172 [Highway 78] and head north to Washington. Volunteers needed

Beginning in February we are requesting members to volunteer to help out at membership meetings. There are several functions that must be completed at each membership meeting in order to have a successful meeting and maintain our meeting place. They are:

Biotite: a flexible rock

RHENA SOUTH, MAGS YOUTH MEMBER: Dr. Terry Panhorst, assistant professor, University of Mississippi, gave me a biotite specimen. I did not have this in my collection. It was black and it would bend. I thought that it was really neat to have a rock that would bend. Biotite received its name from French physicist, Jean Baptiste Biot while he was studying the optical properties of mica.

Biotite is a blend. A recipe for biotite would contain potassium, magnesium, aluminum, iron, silicon, hydrogen, oxygen and fluorine. The darker biotite is, the more iron it contains. It is very soft with a hardness of 2.5 on the Mohs hardness scale. Biotite forms in sheets and is flexible. Flexible means it can bend slightly when you hold it. The color may be black to golden yellow. If it is golden yellow it has been weathered. Sometimes people think they have found gold because biotite will sparkle when is a golden yellow. This is another type of "Fools Gold". If you make a streak with biotite, it will be white. I have a black rock but it makes a white streak. It is used as a heat insulator.

Dolomite a carbonite mineral

Dolomite is a very important carbonate mineral. It's crystal structure is similar to calcite, but with alternate layers of calcium ions which are replaced by magnesium. The hardness of dolomite is 4.5-5 on the Mohs hardness scale and it's specific gravity is 2.85. Dolomite's luster is vitreous to pearly. It may vary in color from colorless to white, green, brown, pink, or sometimes a bluish white. The magnesium in dolomite may be exchanged for iron or manganese.

Dolomite can form in almost any

setting but it is mostly found in sedimentary rocks. Rocks that mainly have dolomite in them are called dolostone. Dolomite is one of the ingredients used in cement. When you walk on cement, you are also walking on tiny ground up pieces of dolomite. Dolomite is one of the minerals that MAGS members recently collected at Black Rock, Arkansas. The Dolomite collected at Black Rock was pink in color. I hope MAGS returns to Black Rock this year so I can collect some dolomite for myself.
