## Tucson Gem and Mineral Show February 2006

ALAN JACOBS: What an experience! If you have never been to Tucson for the annual Gem and Mineral Show it is something out of a rockhound's dream. Cathie and I had wanted to go for years but, like everything else in life, events and family matters always got in the way. However, this year we really had no excuses. Cathie's cousin, Steve, lives in Tucson.

Steve teaches English in Japan and he and his wife Tomoko and their 3-year-old daughter, Misa, travel back and forth to Japan months at a time. This year their schedule had them back in Tucson during the show.

So on the plane we went. Steve picked us up at the Tucson Airport Sunday afternoon, February 5th. The show had already been going on for a week with a week left on the schedule. From the airport we stopped by the Tucson Ball Field and there in front of us were tents, tents, and more tents. Each tent was like a mini-Memphis Gem and Mineral Show. All at once there was sensory overload, I had stepped into another world. We did not realize that is was just one of many locations across Tucson.

The Tucson Gem and Mineral show attracts people from around the world. We heard at least a dozen languages being spoken. Walking around I got the feeling I was not in the US any more. Dealers and sellers were talking in weights and measures that I was not use to, such as grams and kilograms (kilo for short). The US is a little backwards from the rest of the world in its use of the English system of units; but I digress. The first thing I saw were pairs of five foot tall Brazilian amethyst geodes in front of the first tent, and after I put my tongue back in my mouth I knew that Cathie and I were in for a treat.

On Monday morning we met another friend who happens to be a TV weatherman for one of the local Tucson stations. He had ordered up some beautiful weather for our expedition into the gem and mineral world.

Our first stop – the motels along the south side of Interstate 10. At this location vendors were not only setup in large spacious tents with tables setup with rocks, minerals, and fossils; but displays were setup in the motel rooms. Mattresses were stacked against the walls to make room for their displays and inventories.

Since Cathie and I have different perspectives on rocks and minerals (Cathie is the shopper and I am a looker), we just kind of naturally split up and went our own way. The show's main thrust is toward the large wholesale buyers and traders. It was interesting that people did not try to hard sell you. They smiled at you when you entered their tent or motel room.

# Show supports the Ronald McDonald House of Memphis

WC McDANIEL: For the fifth consecutive year the show will commit a portion (25%) of our admission income to the Ronald McDonald House of Memphis, a home-away-from-home for 51 children and their families. Each of these families has a very brave child battling cancer and receiving treatment at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. At the Ronald McDonald House of Memphis, families can sleep in a warm bed, take a shower in their private bathroom and prepare and eat meals in a spacious, cheerful kitchen. Families, also, have access to a fitness room, a meditation room, one of three laundry rooms, and a park with a playground, basketball court and pavilion. More importantly, families find the support and comfort of others who share their experience of having a very sick child. All families stay free of charge.

### Some House facts & figures

- The House was established in 1991 and has served more than 3,360 families from around the world
- Each night an average of 250 families are in Memphis while their children receive treatment at St. Jude
- The House stays fully occupied, with an average length of stay of about 32 days.
- Patients range in age from infants to 21 years, roughly half will have leukemia, 15% brain tumors, and the remainder have other types of cancer or catastrophic illnesses.

### Some prize facts

- Complete fossilized land turtle shell, 9  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches long and 8  $\frac{1}{2}$  inches wide
- Name Stylemeys nebrascensis. Stylemeys nebrascensis is a dry land tortoise and is the earliest fossil turtle discovered in America. Stylemeys was first described in 1851 by Dr. Joseph Leidy. Skulls are rarely found.
- Location- Brule Formation, White River Badlands of northwestern Nebraska
- Age Oligocene about 30 million years

## 9:30 AM (Central time) • Saturday, April 22, 2006 Epes, Alabama (Sumter County)

Children are allowed under adult supervision. Pets are allowed on leash.

Fees: There is no fee for collecting at this site.

**Collecting:** The finds are marcasite, pyrite nodules and fossils from the cretaceous period.

**Bring:** Buckets or bags, small hand shovel and scraper, newspaper for wrapping fossils. There is no restaurant nearby, so bring food, water and drinks. Wear layered clothing for our unpredictable Alabama weather.

Where to Stay: There are approximately 20 motels and four campgrounds in Tuscaloosa, Alabama, which is 52 miles northeast of Epes. Livingston, Alabama is approximately 8.7 miles west of Epes on U.S. Highway 11 and has two motels, Comfort Inn and Western Inn. Demopolis, Alabama is 30 miles south of Epes and has seven motels and two campgrounds.

**Directions:** Epes is on U.S. Highway 11 which runs parallel with Interstate 20 and 59. We will meet at or near the R & E Quick Stop County Store and Service Station on Highway 11 at the intersection of Highway 21, which is approximately 1/4 mile west of the Tombigbee River bridge.

Field trips are open to all members of associated clubs of the DMC program of the SFMS Field Trip Committee and to all members of SFMS member clubs who have provided their membership with SFMS liability insurance. Because of insurance requirements, members of the GENERAL PUBLIC are NOT invited on this or any DMC program field trips!

# Proposed MAGS bylaws changes

**CORNELIA McDANIEL/MIKE BALDWIN**: At the April general membership meeting, you will be given an opportunity to vote on the following proposed MAGS bylaws changes (changes are denoted in bold type):

### CURRENT ARTICLE I: MEMBERSHIP SECTION II:

B. Family membership consists of 1 or 2 adults and all children under 18 residing in the same home.

PROPOSED ARTICLE I: MEMBERSHIP SECTION II:

B. Family membership consists of 1 or 2 adults and all dependent children residing in the same home.

### CURRENT ARTICLE I: MEMBERSHIP SECTION III: MEMBERSHIP PRIVILEGES

B. A Regular member may change (his/her) membership to a Family membership at any time if in the event they are married or if they bring (his/her) children under eighteen (18) years of age into the society (club). In the event it is because of a spouse, the spouse's first year of credit for Life Membership starts that year. They pay only the difference between the dues of a Regular membership and a Family membership for that year and are not subject to Article I, Membership, Section I.

### PROPOSED ARTICLE I: MEMBERSHIP SECTION III: MEMBERSHIP PRIVILEGES

B. A Regular member may change (his/her) membership to a Family membership at any time if in the event they are married or if they bring (his/her) **dependent child(ren)** into the society (club). In the event it is because of a spouse, the spouse's first year of credit for Life Membership starts that year. They pay only the difference between the dues of a Regular membership and a Family membership for that year and are not subject to Article I, Membership, Section I.

### CURRENT ARTICLE V: DUTIES OF OFFICERS SECTION V: DUTIES OF THE TREASURER

G. To write all checks for the society. In the treasurer's absence, one of the other officers, whose signature is on file with the bank as authorized to sign checks, may draw checks that require immediate payment.

PROPOSED ARTICLE V: DUTIES OF OFFICERS SECTION V: DUTIES OF THE TREASURER

G. To obtain secondary authorized signature and write all checks for the society. In the treasurer's absence, two of the other officers, whose signature are on file with the bank as authorized to sign checks, may draw checks that require immediate payment.

### PROPOSED ARTICLE V: DUTIES OF OFFICERS ADDITION TO SECTION V: DUTIES OF THE TREASURER

L. To update and maintain electronic and paper file of member Liability Waiver forms. Periodically provide list to First VP, Director Assistant Field Trips or Designee.

have weighed 50 pounds. Cathie only wanted to buy a few pieces for the kids in her class (Cathie teaches 3- and 4-yearolds). The vendor came over not knowing what Cathie had in mind and said they only sell by the box. After we explained, the vendor said go ahead and pick out some pieces. When we went to pay, the vendor did not charge us a dime.

We learned very quickly that there were multiple dealers selling the same material and if you paid attention and negotiated you could pick up some pieces at a fair price. Since we were small buyers the prices we paid were all right but not like if you were buying 100s kilos of material. I think I may need a lesson in honing my negotiating/bargaining skills.

Anyway, Tuesday and Wednesday were like Monday but at different locations around the city. On Wednesday we ran into MAGS members, Jim McNeil and his wife, at the Clarion Hotel. We talked for a while, and I cam to the realization that the vendors come back annually not only to sell and trade but to visit with one another before they go off in different directions.

On Thursday, the main show opened at the Tucson Convention Center. Talk about beautifully material! It was like walking into a natural history museum, with jewelry stores in between exhibits. Everything was for sale, except for some special exhibits that were donated for the event. Beautiful agates and opals caught my eye and some of the gem sculptures were magnificent.

As our trip approached the final day, I began to worry about how we were going to get the material we bought back to Memphis. Luckily, we brought along some empty suitcases, and Steve had managed to find us shoe boxes. So Thursday night we sat in Steve and Tomoko's kitchen wrapping our purchases and packing the shoe boxes as tightly as possible, then placing them in larger boxes making sure the total weight stayed below 50 pounds which was a challenge.

Friday morning, we left beautiful Tucson where the weather was mild and temperatures were in the 60s and 70s, and were greeted in Memphis by a snow storm and traffic jams. I believe that in the four and a half days we probably saw two thirds of the show. So now Cathie and I have an excuse to go back next year to see the rest and look for new discoveries.

Next year my plan is fly down to Tucson and rent a car for the return trip back to Memphis. That way Cathie and I can buy more stuff and not worry about weighing down the plane.

# Remembering years gone by

DAVID BOWMAN (Former MAGS member): I was trying to think about my MAGS membership days, starting around 1952, when I worked on my Rocks and Minerals merit badge for Troop 42 (St. John's Episcopal Church). Dad and I went to a special exhibit of the Holbrook sisters' fine gems and minerals collection at the Pink Palace. As an 11-year-old, I was knocked out by the exhibit (and so was my father).

I recall helping Charlie Nash and his crew of Penal Farm prisoners clear the Chucalissa mounds in T.O. Fuller State Park in 1953. The trees had been cleared back in the CCC days of the 1930s, so there were 15 or 20 years of second-growth trees to deal with. Grubbing out the stumps was a mess, but once it was finished, Charlie and the State of Tennessee created the State Archaeologist office, and of course another MAGS stalwart, Marck Pritchard, went on to hold that post.

For my own memory-testing, at 65, I will try to recall of the most exciting field trips and what was collected there. We had a wonderful calendar of trips that included Hot Springs (novaculite), Mount Ida (unbelievable quartz groups and crystals), Magnet Cove (brookite on smoky quartz), and Crow Creek (sharks teeth and petrified logs) in Arkansas; Sylacauga (snowy white marble) and Marjorum (sea urchins) in Alabama; Coon Creek (rich fossil beds) in Tennessee; and trips farther afield past Rush to Joplin (galena and sphalerite) in Missouri; and the fluorite site in southeaster Illinois.

Chief among the remarkable MAGS programs in my memory was the night we met with Esther McLean, to see her great collection of Chinese hand-carved mineral figurines-jade, lapis lazuli, malachite, tiger eye and so on-collected with considerable discernment and devotion over the years.

As the editor of a bimonthly newsletter (KEYSTONE) I have to say how handsome MAGS' newsletter is. Congratulations to all concerned. You've come a long way since the mimeo/ditto newsletter days of my recollection. The main purpose of Memphis Archaeological and Geological Society is to promote and advance the knowledge of the Lapidary Sciences in the mining, identification, cutting, polishing and mounting of gems, minerals and fossils to the utmost of our geological and lapidary capabilities.
