April Birthdays



Diamond is the birthstone for April. It is the hardest substance found in nature. A "10" on the Mohs scale of hardness, it is actually FOUR times harder than the next hardest mineral (corundum).

Diamond conducts heat better than any other substance, FIVE times better than the second best conductor (silver). Diamonds are found in a kind of rock called "kimberlite," which comprises the core of certain volcanoes over especially thick portions of the earth's crust. Rollers are used to crush the kimberlite but the diamonds are so hard they emerge from this process unscathed. Typically a single carat of diamond is recovered from a ton of ore. Diamonds are found in many areas of the world, primarily in Africa, Russia, and even in Arkansas in the United States!

February 2009 Board of Directors Meeting Notes: CAROL & MATTHEW LYBANON

The MAGS Board of Directors met February 5 at the Agricenter International, 7777 Walnut Grove Road. The meeting was called to order at 6:25 P. M. Those present were: Mike Baldwin, Barry Burns, Shelby Hartman, Doris Jones, Carol Lybanon, Matthew Lybanon, Neville Mayfield, W. C. McDaniel, Nannett McDougal-Dykes, Alan Parks, Dan Reed, and Alan Schaeffer. The January Board & Membership Meeting minutes were reviewed and approved as submitted. Treasurers Report: Doris Johnston Jones reported that the rent for our Membership Meeting place would be the same as in 2008 but we will have to pay \$15 more each month for the room the Juniors use. The Treasurer was presented with a check for \$1,000 from the 2008 gem & mineral show (\$530 to the General Fund, \$570 to the Juniors. W. C. McDaniel pointed out that the Don Green Fund owes the club \$100 for the science fair awards. The Treasurer's Report was accepted, subject to audit. Membership: Neville Mayfield introduced one application for Family Membership and the application was approved. Field Trips: Barry Burns reported a change in February's field trip. We will go to Vulcan Quarry in Parsons, TN, on February 28 instead of Richardson's Landing, because the river is too high. Dan Reed suggested we compile GPS coordinates for our field trip locations. The Board discussed planning a "trip of a lifetime." Barry Burns suggested the first of these trips should be to a nearby location; Alan Parks suggested contacting quarries to see which would allow us to come in and collect. Barry Burns will look into it. Adult **Programs**: No report, **Junior Programs**: Alan Parks will be in charge of the February program. W. C. McDaniel said we could also get programs from diamonddanpublications.net. He recommended that the discussion on this matter be taken up by the Junior Programs subcommittee. Alan Schaeffer agreed to be in charge of Junior Programs. **Show**: Alan Parks on Show planning progress. Library: No report. Newsletter: Shelby Hartman wants to make the deadline for submitting newsletter items the 15th of each month, starting February 15, so that the newsletter can go out earlier. It was suggested that the Program chair write a short article about the next month's program. Webmaster: Mike Baldwin reported he is updating the dealer list in the show blog, and adding a picture gallery. Mike is also busy judging 24 websites (not ours) in the SFMS/AFMS Webmaster contest. It was brought to his attention that he needs to change the email address to which membership applications are submitted to Neville Mayfield's address instead of Mike Cannito's. Historian/Rock Swap: Nannett McDougal-Dykes is looking over boxes of old clippings and photographs, and plans to scan in many of them. She will probably produce a disk for each year. She would also like to put something "historical" in each newsletter. W. C. McDaniel suggested a name change, from Historian to Curator. Old Business: Matthew Lybanon introduced a proposed Bylaws change in the definition of Junior Membership, W. C. McDaniel suggested adding the old wording, and emailing the proposed change to Board Members. The proposal will be acted on at next month's Board Meeting.

Neville Mayfield showed the Board some new business cards he had designed. He thinks the club need new cards, with individuals' names. No action was taken. New Business: W. C. McDaniel introduced proposed new Membership Meeting program ideas. One Member will be asked to present a short talk on a specimen each month, and there should also be a small activity during the social time after the formal meeting. The club needs to buy a fluorescent lamp that we can use for this after-hours activity, and for the gem and mineral show. He also introduced a membership points program. This idea was tabled until March. Alan Parks asked if Advantage Stone and Hardscapes could be given a Family Membership for their donation. Neville Mayfield asked if we could send free passes to other companies we solicited for sponsor support. W. C. McDaniel said we should refer both questions to the show committee. Dan Reed asked if the club would be interested in having a program on CPR and First Aid. The Board thought it was a good idea. Dan would also like to add a "do you know" column to the newsletter.. He thought MAGS should have a Memphis-oriented logo, possibly with an Elvis Presley theme. He will check on what it would take for us to us Elvis's name. The meeting was adjourned at 8:33 P. M.
