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

For those interested in the MAGS field trip to Missouri, here's an idea of what's in store for you in the Potosi area. Friday afternoon lace agate and barite collecting. Saturday druze quartz and limonite collecting. Sunday lace agate, quartz and barite collecting. Monday collecting if there are enough people interested. There may be a rock swap and other activities in the mix as well.

May Roadcut

WC McDANIEL: Roadcut returns, after a side trip to check out the show, to look at one of the most frequently requested items in the Cub Scouts Webleos' geology badge requirements. Collect five geologic specimens that have important uses. Rocks and minerals are used in metals, glass, jewelry, road-building products, and fertilizer. Give examples of minerals used in these products. One of the best resources is a publication titled "Your House Comes Out of a Mine." A summary of its listings include;

- The foundation is probably concrete [clay, limestone, shale, gypsum and aggregate].
- The exterior walls may be made of brick [clay] or stone [dimension stone].
- The insulation in the walls may be glass wool [silica, feldspar, and trona] or expanded vermiculite [vermiculite].
- The interior walls are usually wall board [gypsum].
- The lumber in the structure will be fastened with nails and screws {iron ore and zinc].
- The roof is covered with asphalt shingles; the filler in the shingles is from a variety of colored silicate minerals.
- Your fireplace is probably of brick or stone, lined with a steel box [iron ore].
- Your sewer piping is made of clay or iron pipe [clay or iron ore].
- Your electrical wiring is of copper or aluminum [copper or bauxite].
- Your sanitary facilities are made of porcelain [clay].
- Your plumbing fixtures are made of brass [copper and zinc], or stainless steel [nickel and chrome].
- Your gutters are made of galvanized steel [iron ore and zinc].
- The paint is manufactured with the mineral fillers and pigments from mining.
- Your windows are made of glass [trona, silica, sand, & feldspar].
- Your doorknobs, locks, and hinges are of brass or steel [copper, zinc & iron ore].
- Your mortgage is written on paper made of wood or cloth fibers, but filled with clay

Brazilianite

RHENA SOUTH (MAGSYOUTH MEMBER): Brazilianite is a vary rare precious gem. It is prized by jewelers and collectors. The crystals occur in cavities associated with blue apatite., clay and lazulite. The crystal shape is elongated and has stubby prisms. The crystals are usually yellow or green. On the Mohs hardness scale they are 5.5. Brzailianite has perfect cleavage one way. The crystals are transparent and disintegrate in strong acid. Those crystals were found in Brazil and at one time it was thought that was the only place they could me found. They have now been found in mines around Newport, New Hampshire.

9:00 AM (Eastern time) • Saturday, May 20, 2006 Limonite at the Bowers Farm, Stanly County, Norwood, North Carolina

The Charlotte Gem and Mineral Club will be hosting the DMC May field trip to the Bowers Farm outside of Porter/Norward, North Carolina for limonite pseudomorphs after pyrite. The limonite crystals at this location have ranged in size from 1/2" to over 4". You can surface collect and find smaller cubes up to an inch or more. You can also dig down 3-5 feet and find the larger cubes and some bigger clusters.

Fee: THERE IS A \$10.00 pp FEE TO DIG - KIDS 16 AND UNDER ARE FREE.

Driving Directions: I-85 North or South take exit 76-A (Salisbury, NC) onto Innes St. West (US-52) following this route till you get to the town of Porter which is about 36 miles. (Keep an eye on the US-52 route number going through the big towns like Albemarle.) Once you have made it to Porter, start looking for Cottonville Rd. - it will be on your right hand side. Follow this road around the bend and keep going. You will see a school yard and the Bowers property will be on the left hand side. Note: DO NOT PARK AT THE TIRE PLANT.

What to Bring: Drinking water, food, shovel, 1/2" sifting screen, rock pick, chisels, pry bars, crack hammer, wrapping paper, gloves, sturdy boots, eye protection, and containers.

What to Wear: Typical digging clothes. There are no toilets.

Collecting Hours: 9:00 a.m. until whenever you decide to quit.
