Messing With Texas Ammonites

WC McDANIEL: It started out with Dan Reed's co-worker stating "there are a whole lot of fossils" on my father-in-law's place in Texas. Several months later and a seven hour drive from Memphis Dan Reed and I arrived at location north of Denton and spent 2 days collecting "a whole of lot of fossils." Just about all were ammonites. The site was located on private property. The area consisted of rolling, sloping hills down toward a creek. Ammonites where found in several places including the hillside. However, the majority were found in the creek bed. At the time of our trip the area was experiencing a significant shortage of rainfall so the creek was pretty dry. The ammonites appeared to be coming out of a chalky limestone area. The ammonites in this area were in reasonable good shape while those further down the creek had received some good tumbling action from the creek. The ammonites collected were Eopachydiscus Marcianus, Cretaceous Period (Early Upper Albian Stage) about 101 million years ago.

- Nonmembers will not be permitted to join and/or participate in any MAGS field trip. Exceptions will require Board approval. Nonmembers may not join on the day of a field trip in order to participate in the field trip.
- An adult member must accompany a junior member on field trips.
- The society shall allow the field trip leader a maximum of \$50.00 toward expenses, including phone calls and printing, for each trip led out of the city of Memphis of more than 100 miles roundtrip.
- The society shall allow \$100.00 to any current club member who finds a new collecting site, and a field trip to the site is completed. The site is subject to approval by the Board of Directors.
- MAGS members will not contact private landowners to obtain permission to collect on sites for which the owner has granted the club permission to collect. Any member unsure of the location will seek a decision by the Board of Directors.
- MAGS members are asked not to visit public collecting sites within 10 days prior to a scheduled and published MAGS field trip. Any member unsure of the location will seek a decision by the Board of Directors.

"Ammonite" (continued from front page)

The ammonite fossil:

- Ammonites were named by a British paleontologist, after the rams horn headpieces worn by priests of the Egyptian sun god Ammon-Ra.
- Ammonites are an extinct group of cephalopods, the class of animals that includes modern-day octopus, squid, cuttlefish and nautilus. Similar to the nautilus in appearance, ammonites were predators that had curled shells made up of many gas-filled chambers that provided flotation.

Ammonites first appeared during the Silurian Period (435 million to 410 million years ago) and were abundant and widespread in the seas of the Jurassic and Cretaceous periods (175 million to 65 million years ago).

SHELBY HARTMAN:

Most opal is 50-65 million years old, dating back to the Cretaceous period when dinosaurs roamed the earth. Opal formed as silica from decomposing rocks mixed with ground water which formed a silica gel that collected and hardened in underground cavities and fissures.

Opal's chemical formula is SiO2 .nH2O. There are two distinct types of opal, common and precious. The way the silica particles form determines which type. In precious opal, silica particles are packed in regular rows and layers. Moving the stone causes light to diffract, or split, as it grazes the opal surface. This light diffusion shows iridescent flashes of green, blue, aqua and sometimes yellowish or red colors which are referred to as "fire."

Saturday and Sunday, October 17-18, 2009

Taylorsville, Spencer County, Kentucky

Lower Kentucky River / Falls of the Ohio State Park "Ordovician rocks and fossils"

Our plans are to take the participants on Saturday the 17th to a series of road cuts in the area of Taylorsville, Spencer County, Kentucky. We will be collecting Upper Ordovician fossils. Most of the fossils will be loose. Very little digging is required. There are many varieties of brachiopods, bryozoans, pelecypods, gastropods, along with corals, cephalopods, rare finds include trilobites, edrioasteroids, and a very rare cyclooystoid was found here a couple of years ago.

Taylorsville State Park will be our meeting site for Saturday morning October 17, 2009 prior to 9:00 a.m EST. Highway 155/55 runs north south through the town of Taylorsville, turn east on to highway 44, take highway 44 to highway 248 take highway 248 east to the entrance of Taylorsville State Park, turn south on Park Road, pass the Park Office and to the covered picnic shelters, park here. If you go too far you will end up at the Possum Ridge Boat Ramp.

For the afternoon we will either continue to collect the Taylorsville area or travel to the Frankfort area and collect in the Middle Ordovician, Lexington Limestone along the valley of the Lower Kentucky River. The KYANA Fossil Study Group has been investigating this area and has been tracking trilobite bearing layers in hope of finding Kentucky's largest Ordovician trilobite *Isotelus*

What to bring: Standard rock hound tools [hammer, chisels, goggles, wrapping materials, buckets] we will be in the sun, sunscreen, sun hat, sun glasses.

You can access our website http://kyanageo.org/ and see some of these fossils and more. Sunday the 18th we be touring the Falls of the Ohio State Park. Meet in the Parking lot behind the building at 10:00 AM EST.

What to bring: A shoulder bag or knapsack for carrying snacks, water, dry socks, extra pair of shoes, camera in watertight container, walking stick, sun glasses, sun hat, bug spray, sunscreen. This will be a fairly strenuous tour and will involve crossing the river bottom on algae covered rocks with up to two feet of water and some current. The surface of the Falls is dry beyond this point, and the variety of fossil corals exposed is astounding along with large silicified snails and other fossils. Bring a scale or a form of measurement, some of the coral head are really big. There are no bathroom facilities out on the outer beds. This tour is dependent on the river level.
