

The November 11 MAGS meeting's adult presentation will be "Fossils and Earthquakes in the Mid-South," by Gary Patterson of the University of Memphis Center for Earthquake Research and Information (CERI). CERI is devoted to understanding the causes and consequences of earthquakes and the structure and evolution of the continental lithosphere. We know that Memphis lies in the New Madrid Seismic Zone, which produced major earthquakes in 1811-1812. Don't miss this opportunity to learn from an expert.

The weather was great and everyone involved seemed to have a good time. You can see some pictures from this event starting on P. 5 of this issue.




**Juniors** Corner

**Directions:** From Washington, Georgia, drive 11 miles on SR-378, or from the Hardee's in Lincolnton, Georgia, drive approximately 5-½ miles west on SR-378. Look for a sign at the entrance to Graves Mountain on the south side of the road.

**FEE:** \$5 or more per person *donation* to Clarence Norman, Jr., the mine's caretaker. All DMC members must sign a liability release before being allowed onto the mountain. <u>No children under age 12 permitted</u> due to the dangerous steep cliffs. All children 12 and over must be supervised by an adult.

**Collecting:** Beautiful lazulite, pyrophyllite, and kyanite; world class rutile can be found rarely. Over 50 different minerals can be unearthed in this extinct volcano and former mine, and now dig site for gem and mineral clubs and other organizations. **Tools:** A hand truck to ferry buckets and hand tools to surface collect specimens. Backpack, gloves, 8lb sledge, 2-4 lb crack hammer, rock hammer, pry bar, shovel, chisels, and SAFETY EYEWEAR are useful. Hard hat required if you plan to work adjacent to the high wall areas.

**Safety:** DMC Members must sign and adhere to the *Graves Mountain Code of Conduct* (see below). Doing so keeps everyone safe. Dress for the weather, and bring plenty of water and something to eat. There are no toilet facilities.

#### **Graves Mountain Code of Conduct!**

- · Park vehicles in the designated area only. No vehicles allowed beyond the parking area.
- No children under 12 allowed. All children must be supervised by an adult.
- All pets must be leashed and controlled.
- The caretaker, Junior Norman, has absolute say as to where you may safely work.
- Hand tools only! No power tools. No ladders.
- Stay away from all high walls.
- No repelling off of anything.
- Everyone must be off the mountain by dusk.

# Jewelry Bench Tips by Brad Smith

### HOMEMADE WAX TOOLS

Save your used X-Acto or scalpel blades for utility work on the bench. They're wonderful for delicate wax work. Use a cutoff blade or a grinding wheel to shape the blades to what you need. For instance, you can carve away excess metal on the spine to make yourself some narrow carving knives that do a great job of detailing small areas of your waxes.

## The Continents and Earth's Core

Two of the greatest discoveries in 20th-century geophysics are

plate tectonics and the fact that the Earth's magnetic field has reversed direction many times throughout the planet's history. New research suggests that the two are linked. A group of French scientists has evidence that during a given geological period the location of continents is linked with the frequency of magnetic field reversals.

The average rate of magnetic field reversals has varied. Most geophysicists agree that the frequency of reversals is related to slow changes in conditions at the outer core-mantle boundary. More reversals occur when there is an asymmetry between conditions in the outer core in the two hemispheres.

In a *Geophysical Research Letters* paper the French team suggests conditions at the boundary are correlated with the convection that drives plate tectonics. They report a correlation between the rate of field reversals and the extent of asymmetry among continents, on a time scale of 100 million years—not a long time for mantle flow. Other researchers think the correlation is good enough to explore the idea further.
